Street light - Decorative

Light fixtures in a decorative, traditional design have been installed from 16th street south to 24th **Street** reflecting the architecture along Mission Street in the 1920's. These have a red base and many have secondary fixtures that are mounted lower on the pole to more efficiently illuminate the sidewalk and to sit below the tree canopy. All other lighting along Mission Street and the side streets are of standard 'cobra head' style. Cobra heads do not relate to pedestrian activities and have a utilitarian aesthetic.

ACCENT LIGHTING

Accent lighting can be freestanding or be connected to existing utility poles. Overhead string lighting is a common type of accent lighting and can be adapted to be used on Mission Street. Similarly, innovative storefront lighting can help add interest to the street and promote commerce. Accent lighting is a great way to add to existing neighborhood character and to encourage positive night time activity. Fun and interesting accent lighting can be organized and funded by the neighborhood.

SUGGESTED ACTION ITEMS

- **Extend the decorative fixture design** that is already seen from 16th to 24th to unify the corridor and create a common design theme along Mission Street.
- Provide pedestrian-scale lighting to increase illumination on the sidewalk; a concern along the corridor.
- Identify decorative fixture types, with the help of the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (SFPUC) and Department of Public Works (DPW), that are consistent with existing luminaries.
- **Convert existing 'cobra head' fixtures** to decorative, pedestrian-scale light fixtures.
