## **PROJECTS**

TSP Ordinance Introduced: Mayor Edwin M. Lee and Supervisors Scott Wiener and Christina Olague launched the Transportation Sustainability Program (TSP), a groundbreaking program that re-examines current practices with new development and its impact to the City's overall transportation network.

Developed over the last few years by the City's Planning Department, the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency, the San Francisco County Transportation Authority, and the Office of Economic & Workforce Development, the program is planned for adoption in late 2013, after completion of an environmental review, which is already underway.

SF Better Streets Website Launched: A new multidepartment City website was launched with much praise from the public and media. The 100-page SF Better Streets website, combines all the City's guidelines, permit requirements, and resources for public space development onto one site, giving the user a handy step-by-step approach toward improving San Francisco's streets. Developed by the City's Planning Department, in partnership with the Department of Public Works, San Francisco Public Utilities Commission, and San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency, the new website is an initiative under the Better Streets Plan, adopted in December 2010.

The Better Streets Plan aims to support the City's Transit First policy, reduce stormwater runoff into the City's combined sewer system, improve pedestrian safety, increase accessibility for all street users, and enhance the quality of life for San Francisco's residents.

According to the editor of SFAppeal.com, a news site that averages 4000 hits a day, it was the most popular story in May, and their most tweeted and recommended story.



- Socio-Economic Profiles Available: With data from the 2010 Census and the American Community Survey, SF Planning prepared socio-economic profiles for the various neighborhoods in the City, including supervisorial districts. The 2010 Census, released in March of 2011, showed a population growth of 28,502 residents from 776,733 in 2000 as San Francisco's population surpassed 800,000 for the first time since during the Second World War.
