SUBJECT: IPIC Expenditure Plan or FY 18 through FY 22 – Final Version for Approval

Attached is the final version of the IPIC Expenditure Plan that staff would like the CAC to take action on at this coming Tuesday's meeting.

Per the CAC's October discussion of the expenditure plan, staff has looked to satisfy the needs of existing projects, and left most of the expected additional revenue unprogrammed in the out years (FY 20 – FY 22). CAC members expressed some concern that given the development and economic cycle, revenue in these years may not be as reliable as it has proven to be in previous years and did not want to yet commit funds that are yet to come in on specific projects. At the same time, CAC members expressed a desire for more time to contemplate which projects to support in later years.

Since the last meeting in October, staff has also revised the overall revenue and expenditures by shifting funds that had been set aside for administration but had not been used, back to the funding categories; this is reflected throughout the spreadsheet with a slight amount of additional revenue and expenditure (particularly in the "unprogrammed" categories). Also since the CAC last looked at the Expenditure Plan, planning staff has consulted with the agencies to hear their further funding requests. Below is a detailed list of the changes made since the October version. They are also reflected in highlight in the attached expenditure plan.

Overall: Cumulative Admin fees unspent to date (approx. \$1.4M) transferred to Transit, Complete Streets, Rec and Park, and Child Care categories;

Line 16 – 16th Street: \$750K taken out of 16th Street / 22-Fillmore per MTA's request to fund 2nd Street OTC removal

Line 16.5: Added new line item for 2nd Street OTC Removal per MTA request

Line 22 – Transit Unprogrammed: Adjusted accordingly

Line 28 – Folsom / Howard Street Improvements: moved \$1.25M out from FY 18 to FY 19 to enable funds to be spent on other potential projects sooner;

Line 30 – 2nd Street Improvements: added \$1.3M for street lights per DPW Request

Line 31 – 2nd Street Improvements: added \$2M for undergrounding of utility lines per DPW Request

Memo to the EN CAC For November 29, 2016 Meeting

Line 33 – Pedestrian, Bicycle, and Streetscape Enhancement Fund: added \$1.6M transferred from 16th Street to enable funds to be spent within the next fiscal year. Intention is to spend on Central Waterfront Projects.

Line 34 – The Loop (17th Street): \$150K to reflect remaining balance of \$500K CAC commitment to the project from the Complete Streets category.

Line 54 – Garfield Square Aquatic Center: added an additional \$2.3M to project from last Expenditure Plan iteration (October 2016 version) per Rec and Park's request; this brings up the additional amount for this project to \$4.3M of IPIC funds relative to last year. Rec and Park plans to provide the CAC a presentation on this and other Rec and Park EN projects in early 2017.

Line 56 – Jose Coronado Park: highlighted in blue: will consult with Rec and Park to see if the \$2M programmed for this project in FY18 and FY19 is still needed.

Line 60.6 – The Loop: \$1.1M added per CAC commitment for the Loop Project

Line 62 – Recreation and Open Space Unprogrammed: reduced expenditures in FY18 through FY22 to \$11.4M to reflect additional funds for Garfield Aquatic Center.
