#### Memorandum

**SUBJECT:** IPIC Expenditure Plan or FY 19 through FY 23 – Final Version for CAC Action

Attached is the final version of the IPIC Expenditure Plan on which staff is asking the CAC to take action.

Cells with orange font reflect changes to the expenditure plan since last year. Cells with yellow highlights reflect how much the CAC and IPIC has to work with in the current year and at the end of five years.

Some of these changes (and descriptions below) may be reflected in discussions the CAC had at their September and October meetings, others may be new.

**Lines 16 through 25 for Transit:** No changes have been made at this time. Additional expected revenue is reflected in the "Surplus" line item (25).

Line 33 – Ped, Bike and Streetscape Enhancement Fund: As you may recall, this is a general line item that enables the CAC and IPIC to appropriate funds in the next fiscal year and allow it to remain flexible. Last year, we had appropriated \$1.6M in this category. Public Works has now indicated that they plan to use \$650K of these funds for the 22<sup>nd</sup> Street Streetscape Project, which would bring that projects IPIC appropriation to \$3.8M for that project.

Lines 33.6, 34 and 35 – Complete Streets Funds Not Previously Programmed: Line 33.6 represents the amounts each year that would be available if no additional projects are programmed. Over the five years, this represents \$10.2M. If we were to continue to dedicate funds to the Folsom / Howard Street project per the 80% MOU rule, \$3.4M additional funds would be set aside for that project (Line 34). This would leave \$6.7M for other Complete Streets projects. At this point, staff is assuming that the MOU will be amended to allow the additional funds beyond what has been dedicated so far to be used on other projects.

At last month's meeting, staff had recommended that these additional funds be set aside for Dogpatch / Central Waterfront since the Department is finishing up the Central Waterfront / Dogpatch Public Realm Plan. At the meeting, other CAC members asked that the line item be broadened to include Showplace / Potrero . Staff is now recommending that the line item include both Dogpatch and Showplace / Potrero, but that Dogpatch projects be given initial priority given the neighborhood's known identified need and the readiness of projects. For now, the line item will be left without naming specific projects to enable SF Public Works to work with the community further work out the details of project scope.

Line 47 – Franklin Square: \$90K has been added per Rec and Park request.

**Line 52 – Mission Recreation Center:** Rec and Park have requested that \$1.8M of funds be reappropriated from this line item toward "Garfield Aquatic Center" in the near term. This is shown by the negative amount in FY 19 for Mission Rec, and a portion of the new amount of \$3.2M for Garfield. The \$1.8M subtracted in FY19 is reallocated in FY21, pushing work on the project out.

**Line 54 – Garfield Aquatic Center:** Rec and Park has requested \$3.2M additional funds for this project including the \$ 1.6M from Mission Rec discussed above; the additional \$3.2M brings the total EN IPIC share of this project to \$8.7M.

Line 59 – 11<sup>th</sup> Street Park: This line item has been relabeled from the previous "New Parks in Soma".

**Line 60 – Central Waterfront Recreation and Open Space:** Staff is recommending that least \$500K be made available in FY19 to potentially enable immediate funding for a Central Waterfront open space project possibly including design work for Woods Yard.

**Line 60.30 – Esprit Park:** This is a new line item to reflect that 1.5M in previous years, and \$1.2M in the current year (FY18) has been re-designated from "Central Waterfront Recreation and Open Space" line item to this specific line item.

Line 62.5 – Bond Planning and Implementation: Rec and Park has requested that the remaining balance of the Rec and Open Space category be dedicated to future work for either planning for the next bond, or capital toward those projects selected for 2019 Bond spending. There is interest among some CAC members to more specifically identify Jackson Park as a priority for that spending. The CAC could include in its motion to approve additional language that would memorialize its desire for Jackson to be a priority for those funds.
