








Japantown's Osaka Way (Buchanan Mall) is the pedestrian portion of Buchanan Street that runs for one block between Post and Sutter streets.

Along with Peace Plaza, it's the geographic and cultural heart of the neighborhood allowing residents and visitors to experience Japantown's culture in a pedestrian environment.



PROJECT BACKGROUND



12. Implement Improvements to Buchanan Mall

DESCRIPTION

Like Peace Plaza, Buchanan Mall is a publicly-owned plaza located at the geographic and cultural heart of Japantown. It is lined with shops which help to activate the space. Funding for its maintenance is provided by the Nihonmachi Parking Corporation, based on revenue generated from the two adjacent outdoor parking lots. However, the community perceives that Buchanan Mall is difficult to walk on, and that it could be further activated. To address this concern, the Planning Department and the Department of Public Works should work with the community on a strategy to improve Buchanan Mall. Potential concepts include:

- Repaying the side walkways, planting more trees, landscaping with culturally relevant plants, and enhancing the existing historic public art (historic fountains, cobblestone river and Torii gate) with new, complementary public art
- Encouraging businesses to provide outdoor seating and displays along the storefronts
- Utilizing new energy- and water-efficient technologies to light the plaza and maintain the fountains

In addition, adding required setbacks along Buchanan Mall (as via a Japantown Neighborhoods Commercial District, discussed above) could ensure that future development preserves sunlight along the Mall.

BENEFITS

Improvements to Buchanan Mall could:

- Increase the attractiveness of the shopping district, thereby increasing business viability and helping keep Japantown the hub of the Japanese community in the region
- Help restaurants attract more customers with outdoor seating
- Create better public space, thereby increasing livability
- Draw more people to an area intended to reflect a modern version of the Japanese village aesthetic, thereby created a sense of Japan
- Improve the functionality of the fountain and street design
- Improve the neighborhood's landscaping, lighting, street furnishings, and wayfinding

CHALLENGES

Planning any redesign of Buchanan Mall would require a substantial effort on the part of multiple City agencies, property owners, and the community. Implementing these changes would require substantial funding. No source of funding has been identified to date.

PROJECT GOALS

Available Funding: \$7M





Enhance accessibility of Osaka Way for seniors and people with disabilities and limited mobility.





Rehabilitate the Ruth Asawa fountains that are iconic to Osaka Way.





Support the business community by embellishing the sense of cultural authenticity and enhancing the commercial edges of Osaka Way.














INITIAL DESIGN CONCEPTS OVERVIEW



At the heart of both concepts is celebration of the Ruth Asawa fountains




A preservation-minded approach that refreshes the existing geometries of the space using mostly city-standard materials and furnishings.



Datsuzoku (脱俗): unbounded by convention


An alternative vision for the space inspired by Japanese gardens featuring new materials and furnishings.

COMPARISON



1. Repairs Ruth Asawa fountains
2. Addresses code compliance issues
3. Fewer changes
4. Maintains overall existing site layout
5. Uses mostly standard materials (paving, furnishings, etc.)
6. Less opportunity for unique design elements
7. Keeps existing cherry trees with new under-planting
8. Restores existing cobble in a code-compliant condition

It looks much more natural and scenic. There are many more places to sit. It seems more community inviting


Addition of Gingko trees




How much do you like the seating options of Option 2: Datsuzoku?




